This essay sheds light on how to attain a college or university education without paying tuition costs and also elucidates why higher education does not warrant the opportunity cost. In spite of its lofty price tag, there are a multitude of ways in which an autodidact can attain a college or university education cost free without succumbing to accruing student debt. Prospective college students can apply for grants and scholarships and can subsequently accumulate enough scholarships to completely cover tuition costs. As part of the eminently time consuming and stressful college scholarship application process, prospective college students may be required to incessantly write essays.

However, in spite of the lengthy scholarship application process, the upfront costs of depleting your sacrosanct time to obtain enough scholarships to completely cover tuition costs can be far less chronically stressful in the long haul than amassing a seemingly insurmountable level of student debt. Another option prospective college students can exhaust to attain a cost free post secondary education entails working for the college. "Schools charge students tuition, but their employees often can get a free education. Even families that have substantial income can get tuition waivers if the student has the right test scores" (Robson, 2018). Whether or not a tuition waiver is granted may be predicated upon the merits of the tuition waiver application and the student's academic achievements. A fourth option prospective college students can take advantage of for the prospect of enrolling in college courses cost free encompasses attaining an apprenticeship. By committing to an apprenticeship, "the sponsoring employer pays for college or technical training and provides a salary" (Robson, 2018). An apprenticeship program can take at least 1-6 years to complete and can easily mandate a bare minimum of 2,000 hours of field work per year (Robson, 2018). However, it can be a viable option to exhaust for the prospect of enrolling in college courses cost free since there are apprenticeships in over 1000 occupations to select from. A fifth option prospective college students can avail themselves of entails seeking tuition reimbursement from their employers. "Often given in the form of an employee reimbursement, there are plenty of employers that can help curb the cost of higher education" (Robson, 2018). This option can at the very least defray the costs of post secondary education if your employer is not generous enough to cover the full tuition costs. Furthermore, it will also allow you to accumulate paid work experience years ahead of your fellow college students. Education is more accessible than ever before and universities are no longer the gatekeepers of knowledge since the ubiquity of the internet has revolutionized accessibility to research-based educational knowledge. The unprecedented level of free accessibility to research-based educational knowledge and ample ways in which prospective students can attain a university education cost free has rendered tuition costs an unnecessary and unwarranted expense. Moreover, a university program does not even warrant the exorbitant opportunity cost to earn a degree even if it can bare no tuition costs on the student's end.

Can free speech coexist with an inclusive campus environment? Hardly a week goes by without another controversy over free speech on college campuses. On one side, there are increased demands to censor hateful, disrespectful, and bullying expression and to ensure an inclusive and nondiscriminatory learning environment. On the other side are traditional free speech advocates who charge that recent demands for censorship coddle students and threaten free inquiry. In this clear and carefully reasoned book, a university chancellor and a law school dean—both constitutional scholars who teach a course in free speech to undergraduates—argue that campuses must provide supportive learning environments for an increasingly diverse student body but can never restrict the expression of ideas. This book provides the background necessary to understanding the importance of free speech on campus and offers clear prescriptions for what colleges can and can't do when dealing with free speech controversies.

Farmers feed cities, but starting in the nineteenth century they painted them too. By following the plant across countries and over time Flax Americana sheds new light on the ways that commodities, frontiers, and industrial capitalism shaped the modern world.

A conventional wisdom has emerged since the election of Donald Trump in 2016 that new technologies and their manipulation by foreign actors played a decisive role in his victory and are responsible for the sense of a "post-truth" moment in which disinformation and propaganda thrives. *Network Propaganda* challenges that received wisdom through the most comprehensive study yet published on media coverage of American presidential politics from the start of the election cycle in April 2015 to the one year anniversary of the Trump presidency. Analysing millions of news stories together with Twitter and Facebook shares, broadcast television and YouTube, the book provides a comprehensive overview of the architecture of contemporary American political communications. Through data analysis and detailed qualitative case studies of coverage of immigration, Clinton scandals, and the Trump Russia investigation, the book finds that the right-wing media ecosystem operates fundamentally differently than the rest of the media environment. The authors argue that longstanding institutional, political, and cultural patterns in American politics interacted with technological change since the 1970s to create a propaganda feedback loop in American conservative media. This dynamic has marginalized centre-right media and politicians, radicalized the right wing ecosystem, and rendered it susceptible to propaganda efforts, foreign and domestic. For readers outside the United States, the book offers a new perspective and methods for diagnosing the sources of, and potential solutions for, the perceived global crisis of democratic politics.
